The Department of OMFS here at Loma Linda was one of only two programs that was permitted to operate at the height of uncertainty, between March and June 2020. These few months were particularly challenging for the School of Dentistry since it is one of the few schools on campus that generates funding for much of its own day-to-day operations.

This pandemic has meant a season of loss for everyone—loss of loved ones, staff and faculty (directly and indirectly related to COVID-19), loss of learning and teaching opportunities, and loss of staff and faculty (due to furlough) many of whom never returned to the school. The rich clinical experience that students and residents have enjoyed in the past was severely challenged and only now are we seeing patient encounter numbers begin to climb steadily.

We are not just a little proud of the OMFS department, however, as our staff, residents, and faculty continued to slog through this challenge. From the initial stages of the pandemic to this day, we have continued to see all patients requiring treatment both in our clinics and the various hospitals we serve. Since COVID-19 was an unfamiliar threat with many expert voices saying many different things, we did everything in our capacity to keep our staff, residents, and faculty safe. We tried everything from strapping on multiple masks to room air filters; we even tried modified snorkeling masks with anesthesia circuit filters. And yet, some of us still came down with the virus and took the most undesirable, mandated two-week vacation. Nevertheless, God has brought us to this point—October 2021.

We don't want to forget our residents who graduated last year under the duress of the pandemic: Dr. Michael Pace, Dr. Parker Shiffler, and Dr. Matthew Streelman who are now out making what we expect is a positive impact in their communities.
